Korean Basic Commands

- Chah Rot : Come to attention
- Kyung Yeh : Bow
- Kuk Ki Eh Dae Hahn Kyung Ye : Bow to flag
- Kwan Jang Nim Kye Kyung Yeh : Bow to Master
- Bah Ro : Relax (return to ready stance)
- Jun Bi : Get ready
- Si Jak : Start
- Bahl Kum : Draw sword
- Chac Kum : Sheathe sword.
- Kyun Jeok : Centre ready or centre aim.
- Ki Hap : Short exhalation of breath, often in combination with a cut.
- Jah Seh Bah Quo Seo : Change stance to face the rear
- Kum Nae Ryeo No Se Yo : put your sword down.
- Kum Deu Se Yo : Pick up your sword.
- Dyi Ro Dol Ah Seo - Do Bok Jeong Li : turn around then fix uniform.

Korean Basic Stances

1. Ki Mah Se (horse riding stance) + Kyun Jeok (guard up,)
2. Jeong Myun Be Gi (straight cut)
3. Jwa Woo Be Gi (left and right cut)
4. Sahm Dahn Be Gi (three cuts)
5. Hwaeng Dahn Be Gi (horizontal cut)
6. Kwang Jah Be Gi (combination cut)
7. Dae Do Se (long step) - Kyun Jeok
Jah Se Bah Quo Seo: Change stance to face the rear
Jah Se Bah Quo Seo - Jeong Myun Be Gi (straight cut)
8. Keum Ke Dok Rib-Pahl Sahng Se (rooster stance)
Jah Se Bah Quo Seo: Change stance to face the rear
9. Beom Se (Tiger stance) - Kyun Jeok. Jah Se Bah Quo Seo - Jeong Myun Be Gi
10. Beom Se Hwe Jeon: spin into another Beom Se facing the rear
11. Jah Yeon Se (walking stance, Standing in a natural posture) - Kyun Jeok
12. Jah Yeon Se - Jyung Myun Be Gi.
Apuro(forward), Dwiro(backwards), Jwaro(leftwards), Wooro(rightwards)
Yeo Be Gi (two cuts forward and backwards), Yeon Sok Be Gi (4 cuts)
13. So Do Se (low stance) Kyun Jeok
Jeon Hoo Be Gi (cutting forward and turn around, and then cut)
14. Jo Cheon Se (Over-head guard). Jo Cheon Se Jeong Myun Be Gi
15. Ji Hah Se (pointing sword to the ground, low guard)

Korean Sword Nomenclature

Mockum: wooden sword

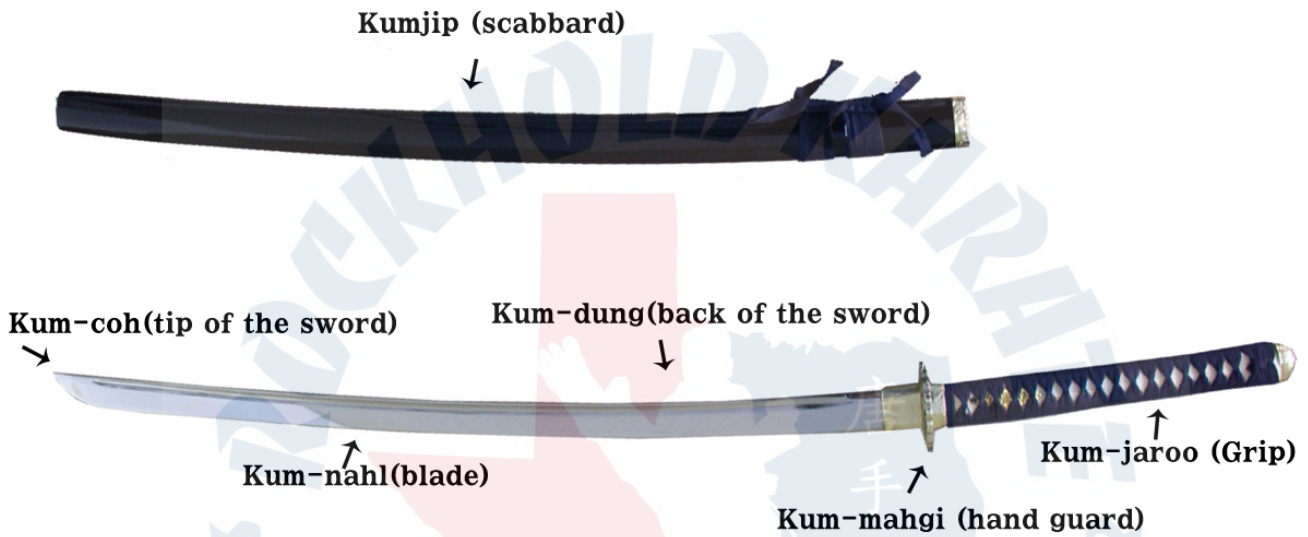
Jockum: bamboo sword

Kyuckum: sparring sword

Kakum: practice sword, blunt-bladed sword

Jinkum: real sword, live sword

- **Sahmkacdo:** three sided blade
- **Yockacdo:** six sided blade



Korean Greetings

Ahnnyong-hahsipnikah: Hello (when you enter Dojang or bow to your instructor)

Sugo-hahshutsumnida: You worked hard

(Usually at the end of practice, to the instructor and fellow students)

Kamsah-hamnidah: Thank you (usually at the end of practice, to your instructor)

Korean Titles

Sahbom-nim: instructor

Kwanjang-nim: Master, usually head master of Dojang, 4th Dan or over

Boo-sabom-nim: Assistant, junior instructor

Yoo-dan-jah: black-belt student

Yoo-keub-jah: coloured belt student
